This Picture is not yet brought to the public knowledge, but it has aroused the enthusiasm of a number of Experts, who all agree that it is of the correct period of the Master. The Picture is considerable larger than the one at Vienna, and in proportion, as well as in details, it varies considerably from the version which hangs at Vienna.

Amongst others, Dr Abraham Bredius wrote me as follows:-
