

DEAR SIR,

I thank you for your
kind letter of yesterday.

I have enclosed the
photograph taken from the
"BELGIUM" by "Ward Lock."

There is no mention of
the painting in the book, or
of any other, all it does say
is "the collection comprises
600 pictures, mostly of Flemish
School, including many by
Rubens etc: etc: -"

I also enclose a portion
of the canvas, as I remarked
before the picture has been
re-mounted on a much newer
canvas at some time.

② when this picture came into my possession it was almost quite black all over after much trouble I removed this.

To be frank with you I have got someone to look at this picture and they do not think it of value. But I feel certain no painter would paint so large a canvas, and someone to go to the expense to have it remounted, without it being of some value.

Its size is about 9FT X 5FT 6"
Some of the faces are very lifelike.

When I remarked it bore a "striking" likeness to the picture in Wood Luck I did not mean in a general sense, but the details and manner, or style, and several of the faces are very similar.

The figure next to our
word on the left in the
photo I sent you, is
almost the same figure as
the one in the act of pulling
in the net with both hands.

The loaves of bread too
are painted exactly in the
same manner.

There is a picture in
a church near here
ie: (Stow-on-the-wold)
by GRAEYER.

If you think it likely
to be of value I will have
a large photograph
taken of my picture, &
let you have it.

The fragment of Canvas
I enclose is from the
edge, as it was originally
mounted so:—



nailed to end of stretcher

Nous avons bien reçu votre lettre et la photographie qui l'accompagnait.

Nous n'avons pas sous la main le guide dont vous parlez-"Belgium" by Ward Lock- et ne savons donc pas exactement à quelle oeuvre de nos Musées vous faites allusion. Nous possédons dans nos collections un grand triptyque de Michel Coxcie, dont la partie centrale représente le même sujet, la Cène (n° IIS du catalogue). L'ordonnance générale de cette composition offre (ainsi qu'il arrive souvent avec pareil sujet) certaines analogies avec celle de la composition figurée dans votre photographie, - mais la ressemblance n'est pas, comme vous dites, "frappante".

I have had in my possession for some time a picture, of which I send you photograph. Roughly this picture measures 8 FT X 5 FT 6".

I have been trying to find out its painter for some time, and to day I have found a photograph of a picture (that is in your gallery) in a guide book "BELGIUM by Ward Lock" and on page 176 there is a picture that has a striking resemblance to the one I have.

My picture is certainly very old it is painted on a very coarse canvas and it has been stuck on to a canvas of a finer kind of a more recent date. This picture of mine was quite black when it came into my hands, and

After much trouble I have cleaned
all this off and "discovered" this painting

I may as well say it is rather
cracked on its edges, as it is not
on a stretcher but rolled up.

The figures are $\frac{2}{3}$ life size, and
painted with much spirit.

"Judge" in the foreground is holding a
purse in his left hand. The knife on
the table is painted so well that it
seems to be on the point of falling
off. The bit of still life in the left
hand corner is particularly good.

If you can give me any information
on this subject I shall be very grateful.
